Initial approval was given this past April by the Senior Review Board, which is a positive first step to move the file to obtain Minister and Treasury Board approval. In the meantime, the 91 AEF proposal to construct a new building for them was approved a few weeks ago and construction could start as early as next spring. So a lot has happened over the last few years and the future looks good for this progress to continue, but none of it would have happened without a lot of hard work by everyone. So thank you to everyone for the part you played in not only setting, but also constantly maintaining the high standard that is now expected of 9 Wing and CFB Gander.



To those who will also be departing this summer, I hope that your time in Gander has been rewarding and enjoyable. I thank you for your support and wish you all the best with your move and next posting. For those who are new to Gander, I think you will find this to be an interesting and enjoyable experience. I encourage you to take advantage of your time here to not only develop professionally, since many of you will take on responsibilities normally carried by higher ranks at the bigger bases, but get out and visit the area. For those not originally from Newfoundland or who have never been here before, this is a unique part of Canada and you owe it to yourself to get out and explore. And for those who will be staying, again thank you for the great work. I ask that you keep doing what you are doing and give LCol Harris the same support that you have given to me. Although I hate to leave, I want to wish all the best to everyone and thank you for a great three years.

The following care components of The Roads to End Violence's mandates:

- Education, public awareness and training.
- Inter-agency programs and initiatives that address issues of violence and abuse.
- Attempting to influence improved policies and legislation relating to violence in Newfoundland and Labrador.

The Roads to End Violence committee provides Violence Prevention to the Gander - New Wes Valley area. This spans from Terra Nova National Park in the East to Lewisporte in the West and includes a hundred plus coastal communities in between. Also included within the region are St. Brendan's, Change Islands and Fogo Island.

At some time in their career, Canadian Forces (CF) personnel may have a reason to use the services of a financial counsellor. A Service Level Agreement between SISIP This may be due to the need for professional assistance with debt restructuring and credit counselling, or for the creation of a financial "snapshot". Such a snapshot, or budget as it is normally called, allows both the financial counsellor and the client to determine best where the member stands financially and if some type of corrective action should be taken.

SISIP Financial Services (SISIP FS) financial counsellors are trained to provide assistance in numerous areas of money management. They also have access to many products and resources to assist a CF member and their family to help them regain financial control. These include but are not limited to:

- Developing a budget;
- Renegotiating debts with creditors;

- Obtaining financial assistance through the Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF); and
- Providing referrals to local community services and other military resources.

FS and the individual Base/Wing/Unit governs the actions of SISIP FS financial counsellors. This agreement provides serving military members and their families with free and confidential access to a financial counsellor on a voluntary basis. Appointments may be made directly by the individual and do not require the involvement of the member's unit.

In many instances, money problems could have been corrected before they became severe if the individuals had sought professional help sooner. The longer that you put off your problems, the larger they become. Financial counsellors usually have a good rapport with many creditors and financial institutions in their areas and can often use this relationship to assist in devising an equitable solution for debt repayment or restructuring.

There is no reason to fear repercussions from meeting with a SISIP FS financial counsellor. Information obtained during the interview is treated in strict confidence.

mer camp program practices the "Time Out" method of discipline for appropriate behavior.

- Children will be given information in order to guide their behavior to acceptable limits.
- Every attempt will be made to discuss the problem with the child or children and they will be encouraged to solve problems themselves.

Parents will be notified when their child is placed in Time Out, and the incidents leading up to the time out will be documented. The documentation will be kept on file, and a copy given to the Child/Youth Coordinator.



With the range of ages in the Summer Camp, every effort will be made to ensure that children are provided with a choice of crafts that is appropriate to their age during regular craft sessions. At specific times, however, the children will be lead in a more "challenging" craft as a group (i.e. tye-dying, paper mache).



Whenever possible we will be taking the children on outings such as 103 Sqn, local playgrounds, local fairs, etc. If a trip is planned for the whole day, parents will be asked to provide a lunch and extra snacks for their children. A note will be sent home specifying our destination, return time, and any special activities planned for the day.

Parents are required to complete a medical form on their child

- Children will not be granted entrance if they are sick with fever, flu or communicable disease. (chicken pox, pink eye, etc.)
- In the event that your child has to take prescribed medication, a release form has to be completed by parent or caregiver.

Accidents and injuries will be documented.

Withdrawal or Discharge from Program:

The summer camp does reserve the right to discharge children when every attempt has been made by the program to address an ongoing problem without success.

Steps taken prior to discharge include:

- Staff will use redirection techniques 1. when dealing with a conflict, parents will be informed.
- 2. A meeting will be arranged between Parents, Program Coordinator and Supervisor.

Should all attempts to alter behavior being addressed not be successful, a written notice of discharge will be presented to the child's parent.



News from around the Base

WHEN LIGHTS AND SIRENS APPROACH

We all share the responsibility of knowing and practicing proper driving behaviours. One of the most important rules of the road deals with yielding the right of way to emergency vehicles.

WHAT DRIVERS SHOULD DO

- 1. Remain calm and move your vehicle appropriately. Don't panic.
- 2. Pull to the right and come to a stop.
- 3. When on a high speed road or when there is no room to stop, slow down as much as possible.
- 4. When in the left lane, pull over into the right lane as the traffic in the lane to your right moves over.
- 5. If you cannot move to the right lane because of an obstacle such as a car, simply stop. Your prompt action will let the driver of emergency vehicle know what you are doing, this will allow the driver to anticipate your move.
- 6. When an emergency vehicle approaches you from behind while you are stationary at an intersection stop sign or a red light, do not move unless you can pull to the right.
- 7. When on a one way street it is still best to pull to the right, but sometimes due to traffic you may have to pull to the left curb and yield to the middle lane(s). This is the one exception to the "Pull to the right" rule.

WHAT DRIVERS SHOULD NOT DO

- 1. Don't stop in the middle lane when there is room to pull over.
- 2. Don't pull to the left in the center yellow lane or left turn lane.
- 3. Don't drive through a red light or stop sign when an emergency vehicle approaches from behind.
- 4. Don't turn quickly to the left into a driveway or street.
- 5. Don't race ahead to get through a green light or turn before the emergency vehicle gets there.
- 6. Don't disregard the presence of the emergency vehicle by continuing to drive.

The drivers of all emergency vehicles are thoroughly trained and tested. They are taught to drive with due regard for the safety of others. Their intent is to never force other drivers off the road. This supersedes a natural desire to get to the scene of an accident or fire by driving as fast as possible. Drivers of emergency vehicles know that they cannot help anyone if they don't get there! Generally, drivers should try to move to the right, if possible.

Emergency vehicles will usually try to move to the left. Sometime due to traffic conditions it may be necessary for emergency vehicles to travel in opposing lanes, against the flow of traffic. That is why it is very important for all vehicles to respect responding emergency vehicles by moving to the right and or stopping.

When you or someone you care about requires the help of an emergency responder, you will be thankful for the drivers who didn't impede their safe and prompt arrival.

Mary March was the European name of Demasduit, one of the last Beothuks. Displays focus on historic and prehistoric aboriginal cultures and creation of modern paper industry.

Prime Berth - Twillingate Fishing Museum

Living historic fishing premises. Fisherman's wharf, bark pots, puncheons, splittin' table, salt cod, dried squid, baby ducks & rabbits. Sea aquarium & unique craft studio. A must see! Outport photo gallery & audiovisual presentations. Winner of the 2004 Cultural Tourism Award.

Terra Nova Park Marine Interpretation Centre

The Marine Interpretation Centre is the main visitor centre located at Saltons day use area. Services there include sea kayaking, estaurant, boat tour, gift shop, touch tank, exhibits, theatre. Park also has docking facilities at Saltons Brook wharf, 140 km of hiking trails, 2 campgrounds, and summer interpretation program.

Musgrave Harbour Banting Memorial Interpretation Centre

Sir Frederick Banting, co-discoverer of insulin, died in a plane crash near the town during WWII. Come see the wreckage remains and a replica of this Hudson Bomber Plane. A place commemorating the life's work of a great Canadian hero.

Musgrave Harbour Beach

Musgrave Harbour is an outstanding community with miles of sandy beaches that line the Kittiwake coast. Popular family beach for sunning, beachcombing and relaxing.

Places to go around Newfoundland!

Signal Hill A hill overlooking St. John's Harbor which has been given "National Historic Site" status. This historic site celebrates the rich communications and military history of Signal Hill and sits amidst a spectacular view of St. John's and the sea. www.pc.gc.ca/lhn-nhs/nl/signalhill/ index_e.asp

Memorial University Botanical Garden

Located in St. John's, this garden features perennials beds, medicinal and shade gardens, and various other theme gardens, as well as a tea room and gift shop. www.mun.ca/botgarden/

Johnson Geo Centre, St. John's Find out how the earth was formed and about the world of geology at this unique science museum where most of the floor lies underground embedded inside solid rock walls. www.geocentre.ca

Cape Spear Lighthouse, St. John's From the mid 1800s the lighthouse at Cape Spear has flashed its message from this point of land. This was only the second light to offer aid along any of Newfoundland's rocky coasts, even though the island had at the time been populated for two centuries. www.pc.gc.ca/lhn-nhs/nl/spear/ natcul/histor_e.asp

The Fluvarium, St. John's The word Fluvarium is derived from the latin root "fluv" (meaning flowing water). Fluvarium therefore literally means "windows on a stream". In our case, the stream is Nagle's Hill Brook, a tributary of Rennie's River. It originates upstream, about 3 kilometers north of The Fluvarium, at a place called Three Pond Barrens. We diverted a section of Nagle's Hill Brook to flow past 9 underwater viewing windows to allow visitors the opportunity to view the underwater world. The Fluvarium is designed to be an "open system", allowing trout to swim freely in and out of the viewing area and is therefore influenced by nature. www.fluvarium.ca

The Rooms, St. John's

The archaeological remains at the site were declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1978. Exhibits highlight the Viking lifestyle, artifacts, and the archaeological discovery of the site. Cape St. Mary's Ecological Reserve

Cape St. Mary, one of six seabird ecology reserves protected by the Newfoundland and Labrador Provincial Park System, is one of the largest, most accessible and spectacular **seabird** rookeries in the world. Located at the southwestern tip of the Avalon Peninsula, a fourpronged land mass connected by a narrow strip of land to the rest of the island, the reserve protects hundreds of thousands of birds who breed and nest on the islands and coastal cliffs of this rugged landscape.
